GOSPEL : Matthew 25.14-30 "For it is as if a man, going on a journey, summoned his slaves and entrusted his property to them; ¹⁵to one he gave five talents, to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability. Then he went away. ¹⁶The one who had received the five talents went off at once and traded with them, and made five more talents. ¹⁷In the same way, the one who had the two talents made two more talents. ¹⁸But the one who had received the one talent went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. ¹

Here you have what is yours.' ²⁶But his master replied, 'You wicked and lazy slave! You knew, did you, that I reap where I did not sow, and gather where I did not scatter? ²⁷Then you ought to have invested my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have received what was my own with interest. ²⁸So take the talent from him, and give it to the one with the ten talents. ²⁹For to all those who have, more will be given, and they will have an abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away. ³⁰As for this worthless slave, throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.'

LOCKDOWN #2 - Back by popular demand this week we hear from the wonderful Phyllis Searle—thoughts on remembrance.....

One bright morning in the Autumn of 1957 four enthusiastic young nurses arrived at the Mary Stanley maternity home in Castle Street. We were there to complete our training to become midwives.

We didn't know each other when we came together but we soon became firm friends. Rather shocked at the many rules and regulations, no late nights, and there was the insistence on punctuality for breakfast, as we all had to kneel down to say our morning prayers led by the Matron or her deputy.

We all worked long hours but for remembrance Sunday we were allowed to be off duty from 10:30 to 2:30 to attend the services. We went to King's Square where the matron duly laid a poppy wreath. As we walked into King's Square the town dignitaries arrived in procession two abreast accompanied by Sir Gerald Wills MP; followed by the gentlemen of Saint Mary's church choir and about fourteen choir boys, all led by the Rev'd Hughes Davies.

The Salvation Army played quietly and then the service began: Last Post, silence, exhortation, Reveille. Just the same as it was when the dedicated few turned out last Sunday to honour the occasion. Once the service was over the whole of King's Square proceeded to Saint Mary's which in those days contained far more pews than it does today. Even so seats were at a premium and we just managed to squeeze into the Swan Transept which at that time was filled with pews. I was familiar with attending a packed church services regularly having been a girl guide, and a cadet at the St Johns Ambulance. The service over we spilled out of the packed church just in time to rush back to Mary Stanley with little time to enjoy lunch before going back on duty for the evening.

Little did I imagine that 25 years later I would accompany my late husband Clifford to Italy from 1979 to 2007. This was where he spent most of his active service during the war. The first time we went to see the graves of Clifford's colleagues lost in combat we used public transport arriving in Anzio only to be told that the British cemetery was some way down the road. When we finally made it we were so exhausted that we collapsed onto the cool stone steps of the cupola at the entrance. Before travelling to Italy we had researched the location of Clifford's colleagues among the thousands of others remembered there but on our first visit we were unable to go near as the field was being irrigated due to the intense heat. On subsequent tours we always managed to pay our respects, and looking back on these visits it always moves me when I consider the young ages of so many of the fallen the majority of whom were barely more than children. 63 years later I am still here and I still remember them. *Phyllis*
